Bible Study 11 - Misplaced trust - 1 Chronicles 21:1 - 22:1

Who do we trust? An Irish survey found that 88% of people trusted medical doctors, 63% TV newsreaders, 50% business leaders, 37% journalists, and 25% politicians. An Australian survey showed the most trusted were: firefighters, paramedics, rescue volunteers, nurses and pilots. And the least trusted were: door-to-door sales people, politicians, insurance salespeople, call centre staff, sex workers and real estate agents. Today we look at an example of misplaced trust near the end of David's life.
