Bible Study 5 – God's power over nature – Exodus 7:14 – 8:19

Have you ever watched the news when a hurricane or wildfire is about to hit? Despite all our technology, science, and forecasting models, we can't stop the storm. Flights are cancelled, cities shut down, and people scramble to evacuate. In those moments, humanity is reminded how powerless we truly are in the face of nature. In Exodus 7–8, Pharaoh—one of the most powerful rulers in history—faces a series of unstoppable natural disasters. But these aren't random acts of nature. They are acts of divine judgment, as God uses creation to confront Pharaoh's pride and prove that He alone is Lord. Through these disasters, God reveals His power over nature.

The context	After the Israelites moved to Egypt, a new Pharaoh enslaved
	them. Moses was preserved miraculously as a baby and God sent
	him to Pharaoh to bring the Israelites out of Egypt. Moses was
	reluctant to obey God. He had many excuses. But God promised
	to help him. After Moses asked Pharaoh to let the Israelites go,
	the oppression increased. But God promised to rescue them.
	When Aaron's snake ate the magician's snakes, Pharaoh still
	refused to let them go, although this was a warning from God.
