

Bible Study 4 – God’s sovereignty & judgment – Ex. 6:10-12, 28-30; 7:1-13

Imagine a freight train barreling toward a concrete wall. The wall stands defiant, but the train’s momentum is unstoppable—it obliterates the barrier without slowing. The train has far greater power than the wall could ever imagine. Pharaoh is that wall (Ex. 7:13), hardening his heart against God’s commands, but God’s power is the unstoppable force. Just as the train’s engineer controls its destiny, God declares, "I will harden Pharaoh’s heart... and bring My people out" (Ex. 7:3-4). This showdown reveals that no human power can thwart God’s plan. God’s power is supreme – no human opposition can stand against Him.

The context	After the Israelites moved to Egypt, a new Pharaoh used them as slaves. Moses was preserved miraculously as a baby and tried to help his people, but he had to flee to Midian for his life. Then God appeared to Moses in flames of fire from a bush and sent him to Pharaoh to bring the Israelites out of Egypt. Moses was reluctant to obey God. He had many excuses. But God promised to help him. After Moses asked Pharaoh to let the Israelites go, the oppression increased. But God promised to rescue them.
